SSC Cloud Broker Service Launch

Vision

Shared Services Canada will be the Cloud Broker for Government of Canada, creating new value while assuring security and economies of scale for the benefit of departments and agencies and where suitable, for other levels of government

Mandate

The *Government of Canada (GC) IT Strategic Plan, 2016-2020* establishes **SSC's mandate as a Cloud Service Broker (CSB)**:

*“Cloud Computing Services are to be **procured by SSC** who will act as the **GC Cloud Service Broker (CSB)**. SSC will **create and operate a “light touch” CSB function** that includes all these functions*, including access to SaaS, PaaS, IaaS and marketplace (online storefront) services.”*

* Key functions are procurement, billing, security accreditation, networking, credential and identity federation, application integration, customer support, and vendor service level agreements.

Drivers for cloud adoption

Departments & Agencies

Demand for IT provisioning services exceeds SSC capacity

Increasing pressure from GC business lines to deliver more quickly in response to GC directions

Challenges to align timing of SSC transformation to windows of opportunity

Increasing demand for collaboration inside and outside federal government

Rapidly changing science needs and unique workloads

Use cloud to enable transformation

Cloud Service Broker for the GC

- SSC has the sole mandate to provide services related to email, data centres and networks. Departments and agencies must obtain these services from SSC or they must be brokered by SSC
- Gartner recommendation
 - Government of Canada should leverage a single internal cloud broker as the primary means of cloud enablement to reduce complexity, cost and duplication
 - SSC should operate the new cloud broker service line as a business with a consumption-based chargeback Total Cost of Ownership model
- TBS sets this out in the Cloud Adoption Strategy

GC Cloud Services Broker



A cloud broker is an entity that manages the use, performance and delivery of cloud services and negotiates relationships between cloud providers and cloud consumers

The Cloud Broker reduces the barriers for the adoption of modern and innovative solutions

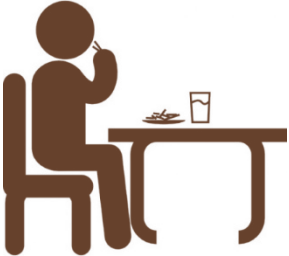
Compliance

Governance (Committee on Enterprise Plans & Priorities): Monitors performance of the process. Provides direction on items of escalation.

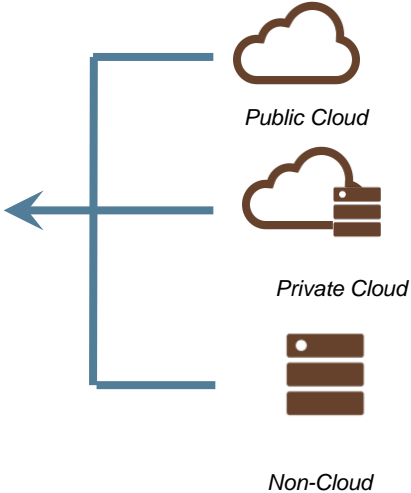


Departmental CIOs: Select the appropriate option for their business context. Evaluation of the choices rest here.

Cloud Service Broker (SSC): Provides CIOs with options to select from. Furnishing the menu rests here.




Next Steps – Short Term

- Award interim contracts for unclassified data cloud catalogue access – fall 2016
- Implement the new brokering business line beginning with a few priority customers and help develop the best practices with our customers
- Add Operations capabilities:
 - Cloud to SSC security operations
 - Service level management escalation as required
 - Usage monitoring, departmental and GC views
 - Whitelist/blacklist as per Treasury Board of Canada Secretariat directives
 - Telecommunications optimizations including CANARIE
- Enable community collaboration to develop best practices
- Measure our progress and adjust approach as needed

Next Steps - Medium Term

- Finalize and publish (TBS/SSC/CSE) V1.0 of cloud security controls for protected-B
- Procure/provide interoperability capability for Cloud to Ground and Cloud to Cloud
- Develop and execute RFP for Protected-B.
- Template security and telecom solutions and processes and operationalize

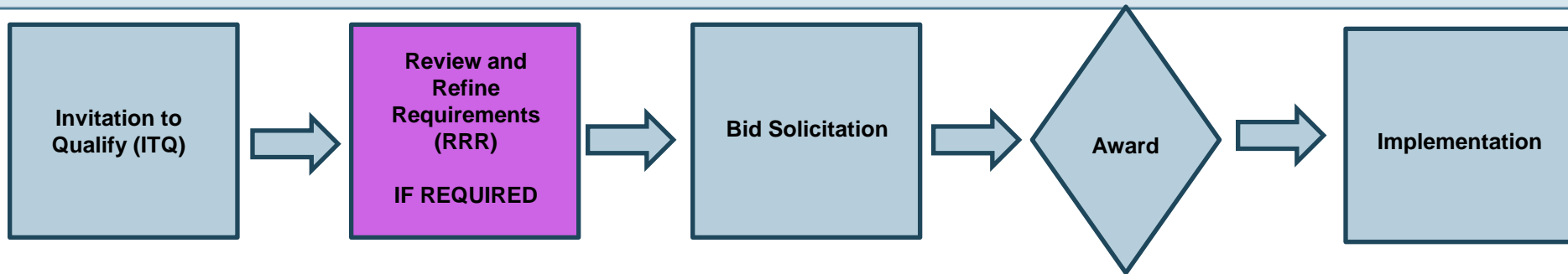

Collaborative Procurement Process



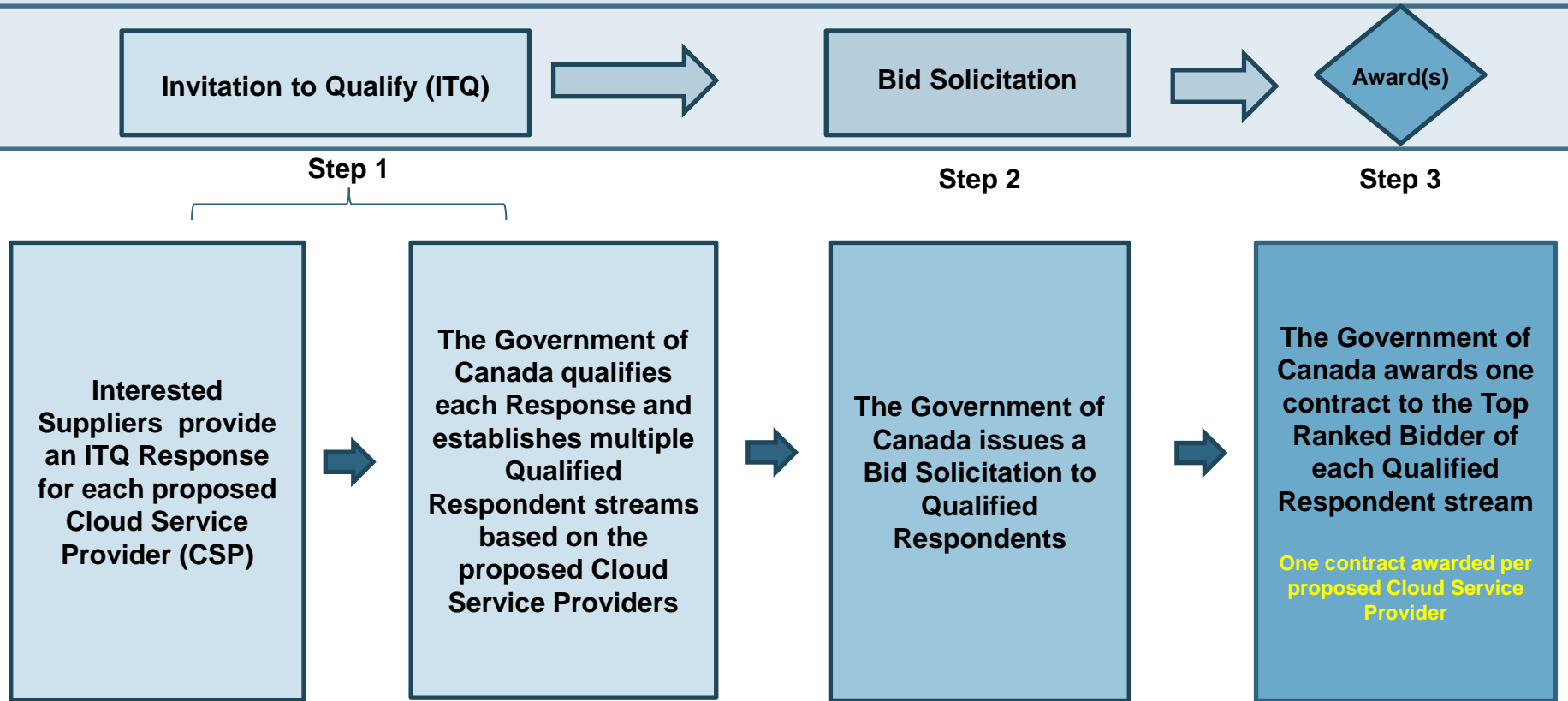
Phases of the Collaborative Procurement Process

Invitation to Qualify (ITQ) Phase: ITQ is the first phase in the procurement process for the Project. This ITQ will be used to qualify Respondents to participate in any subsequent phases of the procurement process.

Review and Refine Requirements (RRR): The RRR process with the Qualified Respondents may be held after the ITQ phase if the Government of Canada determines that this process is required.

Bid Solicitations: The Government of Canada anticipates releasing the bid solicitation to those Qualified Respondents who remain qualified at the time the bid solicitation is released.

Anticipated Procurement Approach – Public Cloud Services



- Each Respondent (including related entities) will be permitted to qualify only once per proposed Cloud Service Provider (CSP).
- Each Qualified Respondent will be permitted to formally bid on the requirements set out in the bid solicitation(s) for the applicable CSP.
